MENTOR GUIDELINES

Responsibilities and Commitments:

- Mentors must be Waynesville R-VI School District volunteers with the proper background clearance to work with students.
- Attend a mentor orientation and training session.
- Commit to meeting with a student weekly for 30 minutes for a semester
- Document student visits through the school's volunteer sign-in book.
- The mentor-student relationship is one-to-one. If a mentor is willing and available, he or she may mentor two students.
- Maintain confidentiality. Mentors are mandated reporters and must notify the site coordinator or other authorities if they learn of anything that may pose any danger or threat to the student or someone else. Student information is confidential and should not be shared with unauthorized school personnel.
- Notify the school office you are going to miss a meeting so they can inform the student and make other arrangements.
- Notify site coordinator and mentee as soon as possible if you are unable to continue mentoring. A closure meeting will be facilitated by the site coordinator.
- Have fun!

TIPS FOR SUPPORTING YOUTH

- Respect youth's privacy! His/her status is confidential and cannot be shared without permission.
- Create an environment that makes the youth feel included and safe. Having someone that they can check in with and connect to at school is important in helping them be successful in school.
- Structure activities to support youth's success. Provide predictability, consistency, clear expectations and opportunities for meaningful participation. Scaffold activities when appropriate.
- Build a relationship with the youth's school staff to help maintain open lines of communication with the student's caregiver.
- Remain positive and don't make assumptions about the student and their abilities. If you have questions, ask the school staff in a sensitive manner.
- Remember that the student is not defined by their challenges and circumstances.
